# 3. Course Description

- 1. Recognize note names, note values, music symbols, read melodies in music notation, and write music notation of the staff
- 2. Know and implement vocabulary associated with performing and writing music
- 3. Perform a melody on a music instrument such as recorders, Orff instruments, rhythm instruments, and/or piano keyboards
- 4. Complete and present, to the class, a research/composition project at the end of the trimester

There will be summative assessments in various forms in music class. These can include tests, projects, and performances. Students can expect multiple formative assessments practicing the skills necessary for the summative assessment. Students can expect one summative assessment with each unit of study.
